For the past 10 years he has worked as an attorney in the Department of Legal Cooperation, within the Secretariat for Legal Affairs, where he works on matters related largely to the OAS Anticorruption Mechanism (MESICIC) and Cyber-Crime.

From 2013 to 2014, Michael had the honor of serving as President of the Staff Association. During this term of office, he promoted and maintained an important process of substantive negotiations between the Staff Association, the Administration and the Member States in order to defend, among others, GS/OAS' classification system and parity with the United Nations.

Prior to being elected President, Michael served as Vice-President of the Committee during the 2010-2011 term, and was also a member of the committee during the 2012-2013 term. Prior to that, in 2009 he worked with the subcommittee for review and editing of the Staff Association Statutes, and in 2004, on the drafting of a policy against workplace harassment.

Recently, Michael was elected to a three-year term as a Member of the Board of Directors of the OAS Staff Federal Credit Union and from 2007 to 2013 he served as a member of the Governance Committee of the Credit Union.
